1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The Institution is affiliated to Bodoland University, Kokrajhar and the curriculum prescribed by it is strictly adhered to. The college adopts strategic plans for effective implementation of the curriculum. For executing academic activities, planning is done before commencement of each academic session. Efforts are made by the faculty members in designing and developing curriculum at various levels like Board of Studies and Academic Council.

The Institution has total 16 programs in three streams. To improve teaching practices, teachers are encouraged to contribute their articles, research papers in national and international journals and to attend orientation and refresher courses.

The college is sensitive to cross cutting social issues and makes every effort to sensitize the students by periodically organizing seminars/ extension lectures on Gender Equality, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics. There are specific committees and clubs that make a collective effort to

raise the level of awareness amongst the students. Field trips and Industrial visits are arranged to add an experiential quotient to the understanding of the students. Case-studies, group discussions, surveys and excursions provide hands-on experience. Structured feedback on curriculum is sought from different stakeholders and new strategies and programmes are devised to address the issues.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college admits students in compliance with norms and Reservation Policy of Bodoland University and State government. The college paid special attention to slow learners'. For intellectual stimulation, advanced learners are given projects and assignments. Experiential learning like field visits, group projects, working models, participative learning techniques like group discussion, exhibitions, etc. and problem solving methodologies like case studies are adopted to ensure optimum learning outcomes. Interactive teaching is ensured through the usage of PowerPoint and multimedia presentations.

The students are evaluated and assessed on the basis of their performance in house examination, attendance, projects and presentations to ensure transparency. An Examination Board has been set up to provide an effective and transparent mechanism to deal with examination related grievances. The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE.

Learning outcomes academic and co-curricular fields through all programmes offered in the college are stated in college prospectus and on website. Our students have also earned top university positions. Some of our alumni are pursuing higher education and others are engaged in government and private sectors.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Bodofa U.N. Brahma College recognises the importance of research in academic pursuit. To inculcate an interest in the students and the faculty for the same, efforts are constantly made. Till date the college Organised one ICHR sponsored national seminar. Total 29 numbers of research articles published in journals, 16 papers published and edited books have been contributed by our faculty members in various disciplines during last 5 years. The college has the policy of rewarding the recipients of national and international awards with the letter of appreciation.

Our college has been oriented socially responsible activities like community outreach programmes. The college NSS Unit, Electoral Literacy Club (ELC), Bodo Students Literary Forum etc, provide a unique platform for the all round development of the students. Extension activities street plays, rallies, visits to old age homes are conducted to create awareness about various issues of Swachhta and gender equity.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has constantly been evolving and upgrading its infrastructure. A sizeable part of its budget is allocated to improve and maintain its physical and academic facilities. With a campus extending over two buildings – the Main Section and Girls Section, the college boasts of having 48 spacious classrooms (out of which 16 are ICT enabled) 2 ICT enabled Seminar Halls, 1 Computer Labs, One Smart Classroom, 6 Science Laboratories (out which 2 are ICT enabled), NSS and IDOL offices.

It well stocked and digitalized library has spacious reading rooms, one separate corner for visually challenged students and an extension centre in Girls Section.

The college offers State of the Arts sports facilities like 1 playground.

To meet the growing demands of technically skilled professionals in the modern competitive world, the college ensures that its students and faculty are facilitated with computers and Laptops with Internet facility at a high speed

Student Support and Progression

The college is committed to excel by extending academic, financial, professional and psychological assistance to every student. Liberal concessions, Government and Non-Government scholarships are provided to needy and meritorious students.

The college provides guidance for competitive exams, career counseling, and personal counseling for enhancement of capabilities of students. The institution has a placement cell to assist the outgoing students in seeking employment. The college has a Career Counseling Cell to guide students regarding career avenues. A strong Student Grievance Redressal Committee and Anti-Ragging Committee have been established to redress student's grievances.

The institution makes strategies and policies to enhance students' participation in creative, cultural and sports activities. It is worth mentioning that our students have won a number of prizes in sports at district, state, national and international level bringing fame to alma mater. Apurna Narzary is an International Women Football player representing the Indian Women Football Team. In co-curricular activities, our college has won many prizes in youth festivals and inter-college competitions every year.

Student representatives are included as editors in college magazine, members in Student Council and in various clubs and societies to give them opportunity to have a say in college matters.

The college has its own Alumni Association. Our Alumni are working as teachers, public men, artists, and police personnel and sports persons.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution has well defined vision and mission and concrete and dedicated efforts are made for equality and value based education. The governing body works in collaboration with Principal to regulate and maintain an amicable and scholastic environment. The Principal along with HOD's and administrative staff steers the college towards fulfillment of its objectives. The college promotes a culture of participative and decentralized management. A large number of committees have been constituted which are competent and empowered enough to formulate and execute plans and evaluate the outcome. The Governing body also includes two elected representatives from teaching staff. For strategic development and deployment of its policies, the college makes prospective plans both – long and short term. These plans are executed through various committees like Purchase Committee, Construction Committee, and Examination Board. E-Governance has been implemented in various areas of operation. Welfare Schemes are available for teaching and non-teaching staff as per the Government of Assam norms. Proper appraisal system is followed for all permanent teaching

and non-teaching staff for financial management and resource mobilization the college depends upon the grant from Directorate of Higher Education, Assam, Director of Education (BTC), UGC, Local bodies and individuals. It conducts external and internal Audit regularly and prepares an Annual budget estimate. Response:

Bodofa U.N. Brahma College, Dotma has implemented *Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)* in 2019 in all the departments as per the regulations of Gauhati University, Guwahati. The college has well-structured Outcome Based Education (OBE) process for the effective implementation and delivery of the curriculum to make the students *socially committed, employable, innovative and research oriented*. The college has been pro-active in introducing new generation programmes and familiarizing the students with various *national education* platforms.

Curriculum Delivery and Planning Process

- IQAC conducts a meeting at the beginning of every Academic year to verify the syllabi of each subject.
- An **Annual Academic Plan (Academic Calendar of the College)** is prepared by the Academic Committee every year on the basis of **Academic Calendar of the University** and departmental academic plans. It is published in the college Prospectus and displayed in **college website**. The departmental academic plans are displayed on the departmental notice boards.
- The Prospectus designed by the **Admission Committee** disseminates information regarding the programmes and courses. The details of programme outcomes, programme specific outcomes, course outcomes, syllabi, weightage of internal examinations are communicated through **College Website**. E-Resources prepared by the faculty members and Question Bank containing model question papers and old university question papers are available in the college website.
- The College Timetable is prepared by the college and is available in the college website.

Curriculum Implementation process:

- When a new programme is introduced, HoDs direct the teachers to prepare Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes and the same is approved by the **Departmental Advisory Committee**. The faculty members also prepare a **Course Plan** in tune with the attainment of course outcomes.
- Faculty members use Learning Management Systems and Platforms like **Google Class Room**.
- The college conducts centralized internal assessment test in a semester and after which department level and parent level meetings are organized.
- A course completion report for each semester is prepared by the department and submits it to IQAC.
- The feedback regarding the curriculum from the students, teachers, parents and employers is communicated to the University.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

The College has been always sensible towards these crosscutting issues. Being an affiliated College, the curriculum of the Bodoland University is followed in the institution and it integrates, to some extent, all

the above cross cutting issues through different programmes. Besides, the Certificate Courses also include some issues.

Gender Sensitivity: The syllabus of Bodo, Economics, English, History, Political Science and Education include issues related to Gender Sensitivity. Economics has this issue in 5th and 6th Semester, English has in 1st and 2nd Semester, History has in all Semesters, Political Science has in all except 3rd Semester, Education has in 5th and 6th Semester.

Environment and Sustainability: The College runs a compulsory paper for all called Environmental Studies in the 2nd Semester, which deals with environment protection and sustainability. Apart from this, the curriculum of various departments also includes issues like environmental protection, tea plantation, paperless college campus, solid waste management, Solar Energy, Pollution free Earth, plastic free zone etc. Economics covers this in 5th and 6th Semester, Education in 5th Semester, History in 3rd, 4th and 6th Semester, Political Science in 2nd Semester.

Professional Ethics: Political Science, Education, English have included some elements of Professional Ethics in the syllabus. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Our institution is affiliated under Bodoland University and follows all the rules guidelines formulated by the university. Therefore, our college has very limited space for formulating a continuous Internal Evaluation System of its own. At the beginning of every academic year students are informed about the Continuous Internal Evaluation process of our college. Our department are assigned to conduct the sessional Examination on time, evaluation of the scripts and to submit the marks in the prescribed format for submission at the office of the Controller of Examinations, Bodoland University. Besides, the departments allot specific topics for home assignment and those are evaluated by teachers. Moreover, departments are assigned with the duty of monitoring the percentage of attendance of the students in their classes. Our college has separate committees constituted of faculty members for conducting sessional examination and end Semester examinations. The answer scripts are discussed with the students for identifying the weakness of the students. Further, the scripts are preserved for submission to the university on demand. The department appoints invigilators for assisting the external examiners for conducting the practical examinations. The internal examination committees are entrusted for monitoring the transparency and effectiveness of the departmental examinations. They collect the soft copy of the question papers from the concerned departments and provide the printed copies of the answer scripts according to the requirement.

Separate Examination Wing: Our college has one separate examination wing to look after the examination related works in the campus. It is constituted of Principal as the Examination-in-Charge,

one/two Assistant Professor in each examination as Assistant Examination-in-Charge, and two administrative assistants. It has one separate computer and one printer to maintain the examination related documents.

Orientation at Departmental Level: At the beginning of each academic session, it is entrusted upon the faculty members to explain the details of the CIE to the students. The sample of previous questions papers and answer sheets are displayed to the students to make them familiar with the Bodoland University examination pattern.

Evaluation: After the completion of the internal examination by the departments, they are evaluated to check the process of the students. The teachers are entrusted to identify the weakness of the students and to take appropriate remedial measures.

Mechanism for conducting Retest: The departments are instructed to arrange retest for the students who failed to appear in the internal examination on the scheduled dates due to some unavoidable circumstances. Such students must explain and establish their reasons of absence to avail the opportunity of retest

Pre-scheduling of Internal Examinations: The examination committee and the IQAC prepare the tentative dates for conducting the internal examinations by the concerned departments. The dates are duly notified in the notice board beforehand to keep the students alert.

In 2019, the Gauhati University introduces CBCS system with effect from 2019-2020 session and with this, Outcome Based Education (OBE) is initiated in the college in proper manner. The College affiliated presently affiliated to Bodoland University and the University accepted CBCS system way back in 2016.

Course Outcomes:

- After completion of the course in Assamese, the students get a grip on the history of Assamese literature, the Assamese linguistic history, phonetics, grammatical construction, folk literature and culture, society and religious traditions of Assam.
- After completion of the course in Bodo, the students can get an exclusive knowledge on the history of Bodo literature, the comparative knowledge on other language and literature of Assam, Bodo Linguistic history, grammar for academic writing, folk literature and culture, society and religious traditions of Bodos.
- After completion of the course in English, the students can get proficiency in academic business writing, develop the ability to write summary, abstract, reviews, reports, Seminar presentations, applications etc. Besides, they are familiarized with the literary movements, use of English in present day scenario etc.
- The Political Science helps in understanding the concepts like democracy, liberty, justice, sovereignty, political theory and history, gender issues, human rights etc. After completion of the course in Political Science, the students can get sufficient knowledge on Indian Constitution and other constitution as well. Besides, this course helps to understand the Ancient Indian political traditions and its relevance in contemporary Indian politics.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The college is affiliated to Bodoland University and all activities, rules and regulations are done by following rules and regulations of UGC, State Government and Bodoland Territorial Council Government. The Governing Body guides the Principal and monitors the College through him.

The Governing Body: The College has an effective and well functioning organizational structure and the prime administering authority is the governing body. The Body is consist of renowned educationist from the locality, Principal, a few selected staff members, guardian members and affiliating University representatives. The highest authority is the President of the Governing Body, who is selected from among the educationists of the area and is appointed by the Director of Education, Bodoland Territorial Council. Principal: The Principal of the college is the key person having executing authority of each and every affair of the institute. He is entrusted to implement the directives of the Governing Body and is the communicative agent between the Governing Body, Government and the University.

The college has well-furnished Common Room for boys & girls. The Girls' Common Room is equipped with Study and Fitness Corner and separate washrooms. The Girls' Common room also has the Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine. The campus is under electronic surveillance with about 70 numbers of functional CCTV cameras, placed at strategic points to monitor the campus.

The college has well trained security guards in place for 24x7 strict vigil of the entry and exit of the stakeholders and visitors in the campus. The college has deputed a hostel warden. As the college has same entrance to the college campus and the Girl's hostel, so the Security guards deputed in the main entrance of the college monitor the time table of entry and exit of the boarders as well as the visitors of the boarders under the active supervision of the warden of the hostel.
